TBS Serves the State

The Idaho Talking Book Service (TBS) is available to any Idaho resident who is blind, has low vision, or is unable to read standard print due to a visual impairment or certain physical disabilities, such as being unable to turn the pages of a print book. There are other qualifying conditions for TBS, including dyslexia.

At present, there are 3,105 TBS patrons in Idaho, but there are likely many more people in the Gem State who could utilize the Talking Book Service.

With more than 100,000 fiction and nonfiction book titles and about 70 magazines, there is a wide variety of available content.

"Fighting for Paradise: a Military History of the Pacific Northwest"

Adult Nonfiction

Author: Kurt R. Nelson

Beginning with the earliest known accounts of wars among the American Indians of the region, this book describes early European contact, including British trappers of the Hudson's Bay Company, the Lewis and Clark expedition, Jedediah Smith, and John Jacob Astor's trading post. The competition over the lucrative fur trade led to the "Pig War," which almost resulted in another armed conflict between Great Britain and the United States, but it was the influx of settlers from the Oregon Trail that touched off the long bitter battles between whites and American Indians.

Starting with the 1847 Whitman Massacre and the ensuing war it touched off, the book covers the next three decades of violence, ending with the Sheepeater's War in 1879. Kurt R. Nelson then relates the Pacific Northwest's contributions to American overseas wars of the 20th century.

Throughout, the author provides current information about the state of preservation of various battle sites and other points of historical interest. Accompanied by maps and photographs, "Fighting for Paradise" produces insight into an area of American military history, rich in drama, that is not generally known.

Federal Program to Help with Internet Costs

The Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP) is a Federal Communications Commission program that helps lower the cost of broadband service for eligible households struggling to afford internet service.

The benefit provides a discount of up to \$30 per month toward broadband service for eligible households and up to \$75 per month for households on qualifying tribal lands. Eligible households can also receive a one-time discount of up to \$100 to purchase a laptop, desktop computer, or tablet from participating providers.

Eligible households can enroll through a <u>participating broadband provider</u> or directly with the Universal Service Administrative Company (USAC) using an <u>online</u> or mail in application.

If you have friends or family members who could qualify to use the Idaho Talking Book Service (TBS), they can contact the TBS at 800-458-3271 for more information and to get signed up.

They can also visit their public library to experience the player and sign up for the TBS. Public library staff can assist potential TBS patrons by demonstrating the player, answering questions, providing marketing materials, and more.

Plus, if someone has enough vision to read large-print books, public libraries have a selection of those, as well.

TBS Staff Present to IOP

In September, two staff of the Idaho Talking Book Service (TBS) presented to the board of the Idaho Optometric Physicians (IOP) at their annual congress to ensure that the state's optometrists and their staff knew of the TBS.

TBS staff conduct outreach, marketing, and advertising to help spread the word about TBS. It is estimated that only 7 to 10% of eligible Idahoans utilize the Talking Book Service. Outreach at conferences like the IOP are valuable opportunities to share information about the TBS with professionals who already help potential patrons of the service.
