Magazines Are Available from TBS

You probably know that the Idaho Talking Book Service (TBS) makes more than 100,000 book titles available to TBS patrons. But did you know that there are also about 70 magazines obtainable from the TBS? (And newspapers, too! More about newspapers on page 4 of this newsletter.)

Available magazines cover a range of topics and interests, including several with a connection to the western part of the U.S., such as "Owyhee Outpost."

Popular national magazines that TBS patrons can enjoy are "Consumer Reports," "Good Housekeeping," "National Geographic," "Sports Illustrated," and "People."

Tech Talk

Does it seem as though technology moves at a pace that is too tough to keep up with? You're not alone. Between new versions of this software and an upgrade to that device, today's technology can be overwhelming and time-consuming.

Those could be some of the reasons many Talking Book Service (TBS) patrons do not utilize the Braille and Audio Reading Download (BARD).

BARD is a way TBS patrons can **download** books and magazines directly to their computer.

And BARD Mobile provides the mechanism for



downloading to a smart device, including iOS, Android, and Kindle.

BARD Password Tips

Here are a few tips to help with keeping your TBS BARD account in good working order:

- 1. BARD passwords never expire, though it's a good idea to change them periodically. If it seems like your BARD password has expired because you aren't able to log in, it may be that your BARD account has been deactivated.
- 2. BARD accounts are **automatically deactivated if unused for six months**. If you think your BARD account has been deactivated, please contact us by phone or email when you are ready to use it again. We can easily reactivate it. Note: When we reactivate your BARD account, you must at least **log in** that **same day** to keep it active. If you don't, it will be automatically deactivated again that night.
- 3. If you forget your BARD password, you can reset it yourself, if you have set up secret questions; or you can call or email us to request that we reset your BARD password. When your BARD password is reset, you will receive a temporary password by email. You will log in using that temporary password, and you will be prompted to set up your new password. You can also set up or change your secret questions on the same screen. Important note: You cannot reset your password with the temporary password in BARD Express or the BARD Mobile app. You must first log into BARD through a browser, change your password, and then use your new password to log in to BARD Express or the BARD Mobile app.

NFB-Newsline[®] Is a Free Audio News Service

The National Federation for the Blind (NFB) provides a free audio news service called NFB-Newsline[®]. The news service is for anyone who is blind, low-vision, deafblind, or otherwise print disabled.

This audio news service provides access to more than 500 publications, emergency weather alerts, job listings, and more.

How does it work? By calling a toll-free phone number and following a touch-tone menu, users can listen to different newspapers and magazines, which are read to them by a human-sounding electronic voice.

NFB-Newsline[®] is also accessible via the website, email, with Amazon Alexa, and on iOS devices like an iPhone or iPad through the NFB-Newsline[®] app.
